I WILLIAM BELLINGHAM CAIRNES, now residing in Yarrawonga, Victoria, Australia, am, in this year of our Lord, 1900, 68 years of age. I have 12 children still living and 26 grandchildren. I am still in robust health and in active pursuit of my business. The following brief sketch of my career in Australia was published in the *Melbourne Weekly Times*, in November, 1896:—

MR. W. B. CAIRNES, J.P.

“Mr. W. B. Cairnes, J.P., whose portrait will be found in this illustration, may be regarded as one of Yarrawonga's pioneer residents, as also one of its most striking personalities. He arrived in the colony in 1854, and is now 64 years of age, hale and hearty, and one of the crack rifle shots of the colony. When the Rifle Club movement was started in this colony he was among the foremost to start a club at Yarrawonga, some 12 years ago, to which he was appointed captain, a position he retains to the present day by the unanimous wish of the members. He was also appointed captain of the No. 1 district, on resigning which he was specially thanked by Lieutenant-Colonel Price for the creditable manner in which he filled the position. Though essentially of a military turn of mind, Mr. Cairnes has shown himself a thorough business man, and with a keen taste for public life. He was appointed honorary magistrate of New South Wales in 1878, and of Victoria in 1881,

and these commissions he still retains. He performs a large amount of magisterial work in both colonies. For several years he held the position of official assignee at Yarrawonga, and also that of Government Commissioner on the Shire of Yarrawonga Waterworks Trust, on resigning which he received a letter from the Minister thanking him for the services he had rendered the Government. He was one of the founders of the Masonic Lodge—St. David, E.C.—at Yarrawonga, and during his long residence in this town may be coupled with almost every important movement for the well-being and advancement of the place, being in his time president of the Mechanics' Institute, president of the Progress Committee, president of the Rowing Club, president of the Cricket Club, etc. His timber and ironmongery establishment, which is among the pictures in this supplement (a sheet containing a number of illustrations of the principal business houses in Yarrawonga) has, through his energy, become a large and profitable business."

ELIZABETH CAIRNES.

Born 21 January 1842 Died 16 July 1909

Mrs. Cairnes, wife of Mr. W.B.Cairnes, J.P. of Yarrawonga, passed peacefully away at their residence, Irvine Parade, Yarrawonga, at 5.30 pm on Friday, July 16. The deceased lady had been a patient sufferer from rheumatism for about 30 years, and some few years ago she was stricken with Bright's disease, which rendered her a helpless invalid. Mr. Cairnes decided to break up his home in Yarrawonga and remove to the sea-side, where he hoped his wife's health would improve. Unfortunately the hope was not realised, and, as they both had a strong attachment for Yarrawonga, they, some months ago, decided to again take up their residence here. The return to this salubrious part of the State seemed to have a marked change for the better in Mrs. Cairnes health, and a hope was cherished by her husband and children that she would yet be long spared to them. In this, however, they were doomed to be disappointed. The trouble had become deep rooted and, when least expected, the hand of Death was laid on the sufferer, and in little more than a week she was no more.

The deceased lady was born at Leicester, England, on 21st January 1842, and was the only child of Robert and Mary Matthews. When she was 10 or 12 years old, her parents emigrated to Australia, arriving in Victoria in 1853. On the 9th February 1856, Elizabeth, then in her less than 16th year, was married at Castlemaine to Mr William Bellingham Cairnes, youngest son of Captain Montgomery Cairnes of the 60th Rifles. Mr. and Mrs. Cairnes resided in Castlemaine for about 17 years. Thence they removed to Echuca and Moama in 1872, and in 1879 came to Yarrawonga where they have practically resided ever since. Their family was a large one, consisting of six sons and eight daughters, all of whom, with the exception of two, were born in Castlemaine. Their grandchildren number no less than 36.

All the daughters living (seven) are married, and are so well known that it would be superfluous to refer to them in detail. There is also one great grandchild. Mrs. Cairnes was a good mother and a loyal and dutiful wife, and her bereaved ones sincerely mourn her departure. Her age was 67 years.

The funeral took place on Monday, 20th July, a large number following the remains to their last resting place in the Yarrawonga Cemetery. The burial service was read by the Rev. F.W. Wra (Anglican) and the Rev. W. Christiansen (Congregational) offered up a supplementary prayer.

The funeral arrangements were in the hands of S.T. Bowles.
